Prerequisite Note:

The prerequisite courses for this course are Economics 1021A/B and Economics 1022A/B, or Economics 2001A/B, and one of MCV4U, Mathematics 0110A/B, Calculus 1000A/B, Calculus 1500A/B, Mathematics 1225A/B. The antirequisite course is Economics 2260A/B

You are responsible for ensuring that you have successfully completed all course prerequisites, and that you have not taken any anti-requisite courses. Course Description:

This course introduces the classic models of Economic Theory and some of the main forces that drive market behavior. We will discuss and analyze models of consumer demand based on the maximization of utility. We will also discuss models of production and market supply based on the optimization of costs and profits. Together, our models of demand and supply provide a

powerful workhorse to analyze the performance of markets. The last part of the course deals with some of the merits and potential pitfalls of market interventions.

Course Learning Outcomes:

As a result of taking this course, the students will understand the basic microeconomic concepts and tools that are required for more advanced specialized economic courses, and be able to apply these concepts and tools to analyze real life economic situations. Specifically, the students will learn and be able to explain some essential microeconomic concepts including utility, preferences, demand, supply, consumer and producer surplus, and partial competitive equilibrium. The students will understand the determinants of the market demand and supply, and be able to perform qualitative predictions and welfare evaluation of how the market outcomes depend on the market demand and supply and various government policies. The students will learn to identify the circumstances when the market performance is likely to be suboptimal, and understand which market interventions and/or alternative allocation mechanisms could help.

Course Format:

This is an asynchronous online course. It is organized on a weekly calendar. You can find a specific lesson on OWL for each week that includes the corresponding sections from the textbook, links to the video lectures and other reading materials, and a weekly assignment.

Each week there will be three videos or sets of videos to accompany the correspond- ing sections from the textbook. The videos will be posted on my YouTube channel and will be accessible through OWL. Each video serves a different purpose

- Monday: describes the models from the textbook
- Wednesday: discussesthemodelsincludingpractical applications and caveats
- Friday: solves selected problems from the textbook

The weekly assignment simply asks you to propose up to 3 problems from the textbook that you would like to see me solve. It is due on Wednesday at midnight ET. The Friday video will have solutions to the problems that were proposed by more students.

Policy on Tests, Final Exams and on Missed Academic Responsibilities

Students who are temporarily unable to meet academic requirements due to extenuating circumstances can follow Western University procedures to request academic consideration through the following routes:
