Registration:

Course Objectives:

This course is an introduction financial markets, financial institutions and monetary policy. In the first part of the course emphasis will be placed on the application of economic analysis to understanding the determination of interest rates and asset prices.

The second part of the course will be concerned with central banking, inflation and wider issues currently facing monetary authorities worldwide.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- -Understand the basic mechanics of a monetary system
- -Be able to understand the communications of central bankers to the public and critically assess them.
- -Be able to evaluate the importance of financial institutions in the wider economy.
- -Be able to evaluate the linkage between the policies of central banks and financial markets.
- -Gain exposure to risk management techniques used by financial institutions.
- -Understand the current issues surrounding the regulation of banks.

Textbook:

The Economics of Money, Banking and Financial Markets, Mishkin Frederic and Apostolos Serletis 8th Canadian edition, Addison Wesley, 2022. Older versions will be fine.

Assignments:

There are <u>no problem sets that are you must hand</u> in for marks. However, I do problems in class and assign problems from time to time. You are advised to do the problems and, more importantly, understand the meaning of the results and relevance of the problem solving process. Often, but not necessarily, exam questions are loosely based on these examples.

Additional readings may be assigned as the course progresses- THESE READINGS ARE SUBJECT TO EXAMINATION.

Policies Regarding Academic Accommodation

- Academic accommodation will not be granted automatically on request. Students must demonstrate by documentation that there are compelling medical or compassionate grounds before academic accommodation will be considered. - Rewriting Exams and Retroactive Reweighting are NOT Permitted: Students who proceed to write a test or examination must be prepared to accept the mark. Rewriting tests or examinations, or retroactive reweighting of marks, is **not** permitted. Students must also book travel arrangements AFTER final exam dates have been posted as they must not conflict with test or final exams.
- Unless medically incapable of doing so, students must notify their instructor prior to the test date or at least within 24 hours when requesting a makeup exam. Failure to follow this procedure may result in denial of academic accommodation and a grade of zero. Students should also set up an appointment as soon as possible to meet with their instructor. Notifying instructors of a missed exam does not automatically entitle students to a makeup.
