Registration:

Prerequisite/Antirequisite Note:

The prerequisites for this course are: (i) Economics 1021A/B and 1022A/B; or (ii) 0.5 from Mathematics 1225A/B, Mathematics 1230A/B, Calculus 1000A/B, and 0.5 from Mathematics 1229A/B, Mathematics 1600A/B, Calculus 1301A/B; or (iii) Calculus 1501A/B.

This course cannot be taken concurrently with or prior to taking Data Science 1000A/B as they will become antirequisites to one another in these sequences.

You are responsible for ensuring that you have successfully completed all course prerequisites, and that you have not taken any anti-requisite courses. Lack of prerequisites may not be used as a basis for appeal. If you are found to be ineligible for a course, you may be removed from it at any time and you will receive no adjustment to your fees. This decision cannot be appealed.

If you find that you do not have the course prerequisites, it is in your best interest to drop the course well before the end of the add/drop period. Your prompt attention to this matter will not only help protect your academic record, but will ensure that spaces become available for students who require the course in question for graduation.

Course Objectives:

This is an introductory course in probability and statistics. The main goal is to teach students how to use statistics and basic economic theory to read and interpret data. This knowledge is paramount to learn how to use math and economics to understand the real world.

Course Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course students should be able to: (i) interpret tables, graphs, and statistics used for describing data; (ii) apply probability theory to model random variables; (iii) estimate population parameters using point and interval estimators; (iv) evaluate and describe the properties of an estimator; and (v) test theories about population parameters (determine an appropriate test statistic; implement a formal hypothesis test and interpret the outcomes)

Textbook and Course Materials:

Newbold, Carson and Thorne "Statistics for Business and Economics" 8th edition (hereafter SBE).

Communication:

Assessments and Grading:

Your grade in this course will be determined by a combination of online quizzes, two midterms and a final exam. The following table provides the weights attributed to each assessment. It also provides the tentative schedule for the quizzes and exams.

Here is how each assessment will work:

Quizzes: The quizzes are spread throughout the semester and their goal is to make sure that you are keeping up with the material. The quizzes will be of approximately 30 minutes in length and will be held at the end of Thursday's lectures. During the quiz students are forbidden from using any books, notes, study guides, diagrams, communication equipment such as a cell phone, or other aids unless authorized by the instructor; such authorization must be stated explicitly during

the examination. Only the *three* best grades out of the four quizzes will be considered to compute students course grade.

Midterms and Final: These are closed book exams and students are forbidden to communicate with any person other than an examination proctor or the instructor. The midterms will be taken in class and are cumulative until the date of its application. The final exam is also cumulative and can contain questions from any topic covered during the semester. More information regarding the structure of each exam will be provided closer to the exam date.

Policy Regarding Missed Quizzes and Exams:

There will not be make-up quizzes. To account for possible unexpected events, *only the best three grades out of the four grades will be considered*. It is worth noting that independent of approved, documented official accommodation, there will not be the reweighting of quizzes. For example, if you miss one quiz that quiz will be dropped. If you miss two quizzes, then one will be dropped and one will have a mark of zero.

Missed exams without approved, documented official accommodation will be given a mark of zero. If there has been an approved, documented official accommodation, a make-up test will be offered. The format, length and date of the make-up tests are at the discretion of the instructor. If a make-up assessment is missed, the student will receive a mark of *zero* in that assessment.

Topics Covered and Readings:

- 1) Introduction: descriptive statistics and probability theory (Chapters 1-3, SBE)
- 2) Probability distributions: discrete random variables and probability distributions; continuous random variables and probability distributions, random sampling and sampling distributions (Chapters 4-6, SBE)
- 3) Estimation: point estimations and confidence intervals (Chapters 7 8, SBE)
- 4) Hypothesis testing: general principles of testing hypotheses; test of hypotheses about population parameters (means, proportions, differences in means and proportions and variances); relation between hypothesis testing and confidence intervals (Chapters 9 10, SBE)
- 5) Simple regression (if time allows): estimation of linear models; least square methods and properties of the estimators; assumptions of the simple regression model and inference (Chapter 11, SBE)

Policies Regarding Academic Accommodation

- Academic accommodation will not be granted automatically on request. Students must
 demonstrate by documentation that there are compelling medical or compassionate

- Rewriting Exams and Retroactive Reweighting are NOT Permitted: Students who proceed to write a test or examination must be prepared to accept the mark. Students must also book travel arrangements AFTER final exam dates have been posted as they must not conflict with test or final exams.
- Unless medically incapable of doing so, students must notify their instructor prior to the test date or at least within 24 hours when requesting a makeup exam. Failure to follow this procedure may result in denial of academic accommodation and a grade of zero. Students should also set up an appointment as soon as possible to meet with their instructor. If the instructor is not available, send an email message to the instructor, copying the Undergraduate Coordinator at econugrd@uwo.ca. Notifying instructors of a missed exam does not automatically entitle students to a makeup.
