## **Course Description:**

This course will help you to better understand the decisions made within firms, by uncovering and analyzing the motivations and constraints that underlie those decisions. The course differs from a course in Management in that the perspective taken throughout the course is not to help one to be a better manager, but rather to better understand managerial decisions from the outside in one's role as a customer, employee and citizen. Among the decisions to be studied are: setting employee compensation and incentive schemes, deciding whether to purchase or manufacture product components (vertical integration), the use of sophisticated pricing systems, and reacting to changes in taxes and government regulations.

### **Course Objectives:**

Provide students with a high-level overview of the issues involved in the management of businesses in Canada.

### **Course Learning Outcomes:**

Students will be able to discuss the issues involved in business management and decide if they wish to pursue future studies in this area.

### **Assessments and Grading:**

Course evaluations will consist of <u>two midterms</u> and <u>one final project</u>. All tests will be written during class time and submitted online. *The midterms have two parts to them: part 1 and part 2*. <u>Part 1 is written during our Tuesday</u> sessions and can comprise of short-answer questions (1-2 paragraphs), problem-solving (numerical/algebraic), and MC/TF. <u>Part 2 is written on Thursday</u> and is an essay question requiring a 3-5 paragraph answer and proper use of source citations.

The final project will be worth 50% of the course mark. The deliverables for the final project will be a group presentation and report. The presentations will be scheduled for the last week of classes. A description of the final project will be posted to OWL and explained in the first week of our course. A peer evaluation will form part of your grade.

If a student misses a midterm its weight will be moved to the final project. <u>*This re-weight is conditional on official accommodation being received from Academic Counseling*</u>. Else a mark of zero (0) will be assigned.

#### **Policies Regarding Academic Accommodation**

- Academic accommodation will not be granted automatically on request. Students must demonstrate by documentation that there are compelling medical or compassionate grounds before academic accommodation will be considered. Students must also book travel arrangements AFTER final exam dates have been posted as they must not conflict with test or final exams.
- Unless medically incapable of doing so, students must notify their instructor prior to the test date or at least within **24 hours** when requesting a makeup exam. Failure to follow this procedure may result in denial of academic accommodation and a grade of zero. Students should also set up an appointment as soon as possible to meet with their instructor. If the instructor is not available, send an email message to the instructor, copying the Undergraduate Coordinator at econugrd@uwo.ca. Notifying instructors of a missed exam does not automatically entitle students to a makeup.
